GREAT Things are happening in Children Services....

The Support Unit, led by Linda Ackerman have made various positive changes to better serve the families and children of Sandusky County. In March 2024 Kelle Greene, Kim Bailey, Teri Robinson, Morgan Lockhart and Grace Ott all attended a three-day course and are certified Nurturing Parenting Facilitators. This certification will provide evidenced based parenting that goes beyond the classroom. Also in March 2024, Kelle Greene, our senior parenting instructor began a nine-month program through the J.A.I. Institute. Kelle will become certified as a Parenting Coach. This certification will open the door for many of our families who need a more intense approach in order to keep their children in the home and as well deal with challenging behaviors.

All of this training will help the support staff be prepared to work with families. As a result of the above training the support unit has taken on a new pathway in our service. The implementation of three new programs; Reunification Support Services, Intensive In-Home Parenting, and Parent Aide Services.

Reunification Support Services is designed for families whose children are removed from the home and have made progress in case plan services to the point they don't pose a safety hazard. This program is a joint effort between visitation and other parenting services. Our team includes Grace Ott, Teri Robinson, Kelle Green, and Kim Bailey. Research shows child reunification is more likely with frequent and normal contact outside the agency. The family must be accepted into this program and all visitations will be supervised in the community or parental home.

Intensive In-Home Services is designed for families who are in danger of having their children removed from the home. The goal of this service is to prevent removal by putting in concrete supports as well as agency support to increase safety and reduce risks in the home. This program is led by Kelle Greene. She has been working with one family for the past two months. At this point, Kelle is at the home at least two times each week and ensures mom has transportation and is attending mental health services as well as ensuring family supports are in place. Kelle's coaching training gives her a new way to encourage and empower families.

Parent Aide Services is led by Grace Ott. Grace has been at our agency for less than four months and is doing amazing things to help families. Her services include helping families with budgeting, housing, job search, and obtaining community resources to assist in meeting children's basic needs.

Independent Living Services is led by Morgan Lockhart. Morgan was actually a past employee who worked for both children services and Ohio Means Jobs. Thanks to her dedication and love for working with youth she made the decision to come back. Morgan provides services to youth ages 14-21 who are in foster care. She provides them with activities, support, and opportunities to be successful in all areas of their life. Currently, Morgan is working with 9 youth in total. Of those 9, three will be leaving foster care this spring and summer. As you all know housing is the biggest barrier! Morgan has gotten creative by using mental health and housing through the college. Morgan is doing amazing things to help our youth.

Other services the support unit provides for families and casework staff include Fiscal and Clerical Support Services. Our agency could not function without Megan Sweeney and Kelsey Prescott. Kelsey and Megan have been working hard to get scanning, legal, fiscal, and front desk stabilized.

On a personal note, as I approach my 26 years here at Sandusky County Children Services, I am thankful for the support of our new administrator Michele Hoffman and our Director Melanie Allen. Both of them have been instrumental in giving me the freedom to implement new services at our agency. As many know working in social services is always a challenge, but doing things you love will always make you stay. Thanks to all of you who support our efforts in always working towards making things better.

CHILD SUPPORT

Spring has arrived...well, chronologically anyway. It's actually still kind of cold, wet and gross outside.

If you're reading this, that means you have survived the *Eclipse*. <u>Woo hoo!</u> While I'm sure it was cool (I'm writing this prior to the event), we in Child Support have some equally big things to focus on now...equally big in our world anyway. Since the beginning of child support time in Ohio legal custody was required in order to have a support order. Actual residence was irrelevant without a custody order. The only exception was if the parents were unmarried at the time of the child's birth. Then it was just presumed the mother was the custodial parent. While the presumption is not changing, how we view the actual residence of the child is about to become very relevant.

As of April 3, 2024, Child Support agencies in Ohio are going to be required to investigate and possibly redirect orders when we are notified a child is not living with the custodial parent. This will only apply if the child is reportedly living with a caretaker or in the custody of a caretaker agency. The other biological parent is not considered a caretaker and will still require a legal change of custody.

So, how is this going to work? Quite honestly, we aren't entirely sure yet. We have a local procedure in place but are anticipating that it will probably need tweaked along the way once we put it into practice. Once we are notified that a child is not living with the custodial parent—either by the caretaker, one of the parents or through an automated referral from PA—our administrative hearing officer (shout out to Cassandra!) will do an investigation. Part of that investigation will be to verify the child has been in the residence of a caretaker (not a biological parent) for at least 30 consecutive days and that person is the primary caregiver for the child.

If all of that turns out to be true we will put a hold on any existing child support case and begin the process of redirecting that order and establishing a new order for the custodial parent to pay. The parties can appeal to court if they disagree with our findings.

This won't be a quick process but it's better than what we have had in the past, which was nothing. Caretakers will now be able to get the child support they need to care for kids in their home. Isn't that what it's all about? The State isn't stopping with this directive though. Nope!

Coming soon to a CSEA near you: Deceased Obligees. Each county has been left up to their own devices on how to handle this situation, but no more! Next month we will need to start on a procedure for it based on the State's guidance...basically a Handbook For The Recently Deceased. (Yes, I just made a Beetlejuice reference. If you've seen it, you'll know.)



The Public Assistance Division is fully staffed with the upcoming addition of McKenna Waggoner this month. Shhhhh.....don't say it too loudly and maybe knock on wood. Wahoo!! We welcome McKenna with open arms and hopes and dreams of a speedy training period \Im We can really use all the help we can get with the increase in applications and phone calls coming in to the call center.

We have also seen an increase in skimming and cloning EBT card cases. In 2023, there were only 10 people who were a victim of having their benefits stolen. So far, in 2024, there have been 26 people....and it is only April folks. The amount of stolen benefits has reached over \$12,000. These benefits won't be able to be replaced forever so we are strongly urging our customers to frequently change their pins. They can also utilize the cool feature on the app that allows them to turn off their card while they are not using it.

Here are some numbers from our 2023 annual report:

In 2023, there were 4,952 applications filed for Sandusky County residents, an average of 412 applications per month. An average of 15,890 people were on Medicaid. \$13,050,381.00 was issued in SNAP. That is about all I can tell you about those two programs since the state dashboard has yet to update the end of year stats. It's fine. No rush \Im

Our PRC unit was busy last year in helping fund 183 families throughout the year. This was through helping with car repairs, home repairs, furniture, rental assistance, school supplies, and some special projects made available by Covid-related grants. We hope to continue aiding the community throughout the year. Stay tuned for our next backpack/school supplies drive.

In our Fraud Unit we were able to collect \$46,401.90 in overpayments. Pete has also been busy with the 41 investigations he conducted last year. We will be celebrating Fraud Awareness in May as well.

Our workers do an amazing job trying to push through as many calls and applications that come in. They deserve a huge pat on the back!!!

While connected to the State network, open the Software Center icon on your desktop or under Start.





It is Best Practice to change your Jabber password thru the My Self Care Portal <u>https://myphone3.ngtsohio.com/ucmuser/</u> whenever you change your MyOhio password. And if you ever click reset at the Jabber sign in screen, you will then need to successfully sign in with your Jabber <u>#@ngtsohio.com</u>.

LEGAL DIVISION

The combined total of children services and CSEA court hearings went from 753 in 2022 to 981 in 2023: up 30%

In 2022, 87.5% of obligors in contempt successfully purged their jail sentences and four obligors served jail time or currently have outstanding warrants The CSEA legal secretary processed 311 legal referrals from CSEA investigators in 2023, up 37 from 2022

In 2023, approximately \$75,014.00 was collected in child support from obligors participating in Seek Work Court. A 32% increase over 2022

The number of children services hearings increased from 319 in 2022 to 398 in 2023. This is likely due to a 16% increase in new cases filed with the Court and an increase in contested hearings
